

Weekly/Daily Routines

- Every morning the children will have a <u>morning activity</u>. These are planned throughout the week to help settle the children, help cover curriculum objectives and to help get them focussed ready for the day ahead, these include: Handwriting, Maths Challenges, Creative writing opportunities, reading tasks, class worship and free drawing.
- Children are expected to have their: <u>Recognition cards</u>. reading records and homework due in on time on a weekly basis and it is essential that the children take the responsibility to get these organised.
- On PE days, it is essential that your child arrives to school in their PE Kits (Monday & Thursdays Y3 and Mondays & Wednesdays Y4)
- Please note that your child should come to school with: no jewellery apart from a pair of studded earrings; no painted nails; no loose hair below their shoulders without a hair tie or access to smart watches linked directly to a mobile phone)
- Please ensure your child has access to a water bottle for the day and has a break time snack in the form of fruit or vegetables
- Each child should have a coat in school and have access to the appropriate footwear for social times such as a spare pair of shoes/trainers

Homework

- Homework is given out on a Wednesday and is expected back on a Tuesday morning.
- Children have to complete at least one Maths and one Literacy activity a week children can complete any additional activities if they like by using our educational sites:

- There will be an in-depth project focussed homework sent out each half term, which can be emailed to teachers via <u>office@blakedownprimary.worcs.sch.uk</u> or in the case of models, brought in on the designated day.
- Homework should be completed to the best of the child's ability and they should be proud of what they hand in, when it is due - please record this in pencil and ensure they try as much as they can independently.
- There is a homework club available for the children to utilise on a Tuesday lunchtime

Microsoft OneNote

- Year 3 -6 will be receiving homework via the Microsoft OneNote platform
- This can be accessed through Office 365 See supporting documents on the website for help with accessing this
- The children will need to know their U: and P: to access this account at home. The children will become familiar with these log in details as they will be using them within their computing sessions

Curriculum: Key Stage 2

- The demands of the curriculum continue to depend on children mastering their objectives by the end of their year groups. Standards are high and since changes to the curriculum in 2014, children will either be: working towards, working at or working at greater depth within their curriculum objectives and this will be reported at parents evenings and within their summer report.
- Each year has objectives that have to be taught, learned and understood by the children so that they can achieve the 'expected standard'. They are progressive, therefore it is important that each year the children build on previous year's knowledge.
- Our learning is planned to be <u>interconnected</u> where possible, whilst also ensuring children learn knowledge and skills for each subject area. Due to the volume of coverage needed for the children to reach the standard by the end of the year.

End of Term Assessments

- Class teachers will be assessing your child in many different ways: one of the ways we assess the children is through end of term assessments or end of topic assessments. These help to support our teacher judgements formed on a daily basis.
- In Years 3 & 4, you will find that we assess the children by using end of topic tests, quizzes and 'in the moment' assessment throughout different units of work.
- These will most often be shared with pupils and parents but where this data is only used as a baseline at the beginning of the year, children will not necessarily be told their scores
- These assessments will then be used to support future planning and any interventions that children may benefit from

Curriculum: Trips and Visits

- Our trips and visits are planned to specifically meet certain objectives and to support the learning happening within the classroom. This helps to deepen the children's understanding and allows them to have hands on experiences.
 - Where possible, a trip or visit is planned once a term in the hope that all children will have the opportunity to learn through a hands on approach.




Our Christian Ethos

We want our children to be equipped with a love of learning and the skills and resilience to flourish in the face of life's challenges to **ACHIEVE** and be the best version of themselves.




Emotional Health and Wellbeing at Blakedown

<u>Behaviour/Recognition Board</u> <u>Expectations</u>



- Children are expected to abide by our school rules and values and behave in a way that helps them to learn, be safe and be respectful.
- The recognition board allows us to praise positive behaviour and encourages them to achieve in all aspects of school.
- If children do not make a good choice, they will be given a verbal warning which advises them about the inappropriate choice, the affect and possible consequence.
- If children continue not to make a good choice, an appropriate consequence will be issued and further discussion about how to make better choices in the future will take place.
- Key stage leads and parents may need to be contacted.

If a child has been recognised often throughout the week, they may be recognised within our Friday recognition assembly.

<u>Behaviour/Recognition Board</u> <u>Expectations</u>



- In KS2, a consequence for a child may be to miss a part of their break time or lunch time.
- If this behaviour persists following warnings and reminders, parents will be contacted and involved in conversations with both the teacher and child.
- If this still continues to be an issue then parents will be invited in to discuss a formal action plan to support an improvement in their child's behaviour. Further consequences such as earning a right to take part in events may also be issued.
- We expect that children abide by our expectations, as a school, in respect of both their teaching staff and their peers
- We would thank all parents for supporting us with this both in and out of school.

<u>Where to find</u> <u>information/points</u> <u>of contact</u>

Building Relationships


We work hard to build strong relationships between staff, parents and children in order to provide the best learning environment for everyone at Blakedown CE Primary School.
